2. To encourage students to practice reading, listening, speaking, and writing through activities based on the 7 steps to English proficiency by Rev.Bro.Bancha Saenghiran.

3. To develop student's confidence in communication and presentation for English speaking community.

Course Description

English for All by Albert Laurence (E4ALL), *an activities-based English learning*, is designed to promote positive attitude towards English learning and to develop Basic English communication skills for academic success at university level. This course will provide opportunity for students to learn how to explore and expand ideas in writing, as well as how to summarize idea in reading comprehension. Students of this course will be prompted to be familiar with English communication environment through activities developed from the concept of Albert Laurence's 7 steps to English Proficiency.

- 232 students of 268 students or 86.5% have successfully passed the program

Statistics Results

- Student's *Level of Satisfaction towards course curriculum* showed the highest level of satisfaction of 86% or 4.30 of 5-point-scale
- Student's *Level of Satisfaction towards facilitators/teachers* showed the highest level of satisfaction of 89.8% or 4.49 of 5-point-scale
- The study of *Student's Confidence in English language* usage shows a *scientific significant development at 0.01 point* of student's confidence after participation to the program as shown in statistics

Program Development

- SKILL TRAINING WORKSHOP. New Skill Training Workshop has been established to be an incubator of English for ALL program members who needed a special attention in a particular English communication skill. The workshop was organized as a parallel program along with English for ALL for both semesters.
- 2. CAREER PLANNING. Learning Support Center has collaborated with Career Development Center to introduce new class content in the week number 3 of English for ALL with the name of "Career Planning". Students learned about career aspiration, MBTI and other personality tests and a concept of AEC through English content. Guest speakers are career advisors from Career Development Center of Student Affairs.
- 3. **TRAIN THE TRAINERS.** All trainers of the program have been through the official workshop of "Train the Trainers" that is newly introduced to the program.
- 4. PAPER PRESENTATION IN APSSA JAPAN. English for ALL by Albert Laurence program has been selected as a concurrent session for presentation at The Asia Pacific Student Services Association (APSSA) in Kyoto, Japan on 8th August 2014. It is wellreceived that interested audience from different university around the world has joined and discussed about English for ALL program at the seminar. The article was written and presented by A.Piya Sailomraksa from Learning Support Center of Student Affairs.
- 5. **E4ALL.AU.EDU**. The English for ALL website has been 2 years old in 2014. It becomes a big hit and visitors reached 6,000 hits on the same year. Besides students can apply E4ALL program and complete the test online, gallery and interactive web-board have been opened to communicate with parents in parent relation section of the website.



The following table shows the result of the difference between the average Pre-test and Post-test scores of English for ALL students before and after the program on the scale 1 to 10, which 1 represents the lowest confidence and 10 represents highest confidence in each factor. From the result of semester 1-2013, Students from the program have been thoroughly developed in all factors as shown in the difference column.




Follow up process

The follow-up process has been settled during the year 2014. After the program and students had passed the final examination of all courses during first semester, the team has reviewed their English course grades as reference to follow their performance in English proficiency. 72 English for ALL students who have been studying Basic English course, 69 students (95.8%) has successfully passed the course to English I and 3 students failed and had the repeat Basic English course. For English for ALL students who has been studying in English I, out of 87 students, 82 students (94.5%) have passed to English II and 5 students failed or dropped. Among these students, 49 students (56.3%) have got A grade from English I course. All 3 students in English for ALL program who has been studying English II have all passed English II with A grade.


For students who have failed the regular English course, the team has asked them to join the indepth interview and counseling intervention to help them improve their performance.


